

Alyftrek - the low down

What is it?

Alyftrek is designed to increase the amount of CFTR protein that your body can use. It also improves the flow of salt and water between cells. Like Kaftrio. it can improve sweat chloride levels, lung function and other symptoms of CF.

This is the next triple modulator, replacing Kaftrio and Kalydeco. It is now available for us to prescribe and we will be discussing it with you at your upcoming clinic visits over the next few months. It is suitable for everyone already on Kaftrio/Kalydeco.

How is it different to **Kaftrio and Kaydeco?**

It contains a different combination of drugs:

Kaftrio – Elexacafotr/Tezacaftor/ **Ivacaftor** Alfyftrek – Vanzacaftor/

Tezacaftor/Deutivacaftor Kalydeco – Ivacaftor

Alyftrek only needs to be taken once a day (two capsules once a day).

It can be taken at anytime during the day with a fat containing food. It should however be taken at the same time everyday.

Why the change?

Some people have not tolerated Kaftrio due to side effects or found it to be not very effective. Also it may have some additional health benefits and it only needs to be taken once a day.

Is it any better?

In research trials, Alyftrek was equivalent to Kaftrio, but more people with CF had a normal sweat chloride on Alyftrek than with Kaftrio. This means that Alyftrek is better at increasing CFTR function than Kaftrio in some people, which may have longterm health benefits.

Can I wait to start or switch to Alyftrek?

Yes, we would prefer you to change over when your supply of Kaftrio/Kaydeco runs out.

Can I switch back to Kaftrio if I don't like Alyftrek?

Yes you can.

Will my bloods need to be monitored?

Yes, you will need to have three monthly blood tests for the first 12 months of taking Alyftrek. This may need to continue or be more frequent if your liver function tests are abnormal.

Liver ultrasound and fibroscans

You doctor may refer you for a liver ultrasound scan or fibroscan if you have abnormal liver function test results. It is important to attend these appointments as failure to do so may suspend your prescription and supply of Kaftrio/Kalydeco/Alytrek.

These scans are important for monitoring your response to these medications. There are limited appointment slots, therefore we would appreciate if you could attend the appointment time you are given or contact the radiology service to rearrange.






Changes to how we check your lungs at the West Midlands Adult CF Centre

Physiotherapy

Just a reminder to collect your hospital supplied medicines when you come for your clinic appointment as we are no longer able to deliver these to you. You can call or text the CF Physiotherapy Team before your appointment for nebulised medicines on **07772 137 613**.

If you are collecting outside of a clinic appointment Heartlands pharmacy is open Monday to Friday 08:30–18:00.

You can also collect from the hospital discharge pharmacy (opposite Marks and Spencers) Saturday and Sunday 10:30–16:30. If you wish to check a prescription is ready for you to collect you can call **0121 424 0118**.

Your privacy is important to us

At the West Midlands Adult CF Centre, your privacy is our priority. We are legally required to protect your personal health information and cannot share it without your permission.

The safest way to manage your care and keep your information safe is for you to contact the CF team directly. We know managing a long-term condition like cystic fibrosis can be challenging, and you may want support from friends or family. However, we must have your consent before we can discuss any part of your care with them.

Diabetes news

The drug manufacturer Novo Nordisk has announced it will withdraw Levemir insulin in all forms by the end of 2026. **Here**, we look at what this means for people with diabetes who are affected, and what happens next. Our CF diabetes nurse will discuss

Pancreatic Enzyme Therapy

(Creon 10 000, Creon 25 000 Nutrizym 22)

Community pharmacies have the same access to supplies of pancreatic enzymes (Creon 10,000, Creon 25 000 or Nutrizym 22) as the hospital pharmacy. Therefore, we are only able to supply these from the hospital pharmacy if you have requested a prescription from your GP and your community pharmacy is unable to fulfil this.
